
Bill and I made many wonderful memories with our friends, our family here at St.

loved Bill Holloway and husband of our President, Socorro.

Bill and Socorro worked for years visiting those who could not come to us by helping them in their own homes. It was soon discovered that Bill's heart was bigger than himself. When the Urban Rest Stop was started, Bill became a guiding light for those who came in to shower and do laundry. Because of Bill, TC, Lee and so many other volunteers, those who came in, received more than just services. They received friendship and a caring place to escape the lonely streets. Bill often went the extra mile in helping others. He took part in people's lives, giving haircuts, providing rides to those in need, giving advice when asked and finding answers to many people's

dilemmas.

On Dec 7th 2014, Pearl Harbor day, as if requested by God himself, we honored Bill for his many years of service with a Marine Honor Guard and a plaque at our volunteer Christmas party.

Al Zon read the plaque which stated "To Bill Holloway. For your many years of tireless service in providing basic services to the needy in their homes as well as in the Urban Rest Stop. You are a guiding star to what we are called to be. With love from all the Vincentians. Haze gray and under way"

"Haze gray and under way" is a navy greeting that Bill graced us with, when you saw him in the URS or in the office. The color of Navy ships is called haze gray and under way meant you were leaving port on another tour at sea. Bill was able to share a few words of thanks for honoring him and the Honor Guard concluded by leading us all in the pledge of allegiance.

Here is Bill's obituary:

William "Bill" Holloway was born on August 16, 1937 to Pascal C. Holloway and Ruby Zoe Brow in Douglas, Wyoming.

At the age of 17, Bill joined the U.S. Navy and served for 30 years, retiring in 1984. His Navy career included serving during the Vietnam Conflict and aboard the USS Yorktown, USS Blue Ridge, and the USS

Midway. He was stationed in Japan for much of his career. He reached the rank of Signalman Master Chief, the highest enlisted rank in the Navy.

Bill and Socorro married in 1990 and moved to Medford, Oregon where he enjoyed golf, racquetball, and gardening. While attending church at Shepherd of the Valley, he answered a plea for volunteers at St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP). He was involved with SVDP's Urban Rest Stop, Needy Med's Program, and Shepherd of the Valley's Home Visit Team. For fifteen years, Bill was instrumental in helping Medford's homeless with social service resources, advice, haircuts and donuts.

He is survived by his wife, Socorro; brother James O. Holloway of Moore, Oklahoma, and sister Vickie Griswold of Warren, Michigan, daughter Linda Beam, granddaughter Stephanie (Lorenzo) Valdivia, and great-grandson Jared Valdivia. He leaves behind many loving nieces and nephews.

He is preceded in death by his parents, brothers: James A. Holloway, Cloyd T. "Mike" Hall, and sisters: Jackie Donovan, Marie Adams, and Debbie Acuna.

Memorial services were held on Monday, February 16th, 2015, in the St. Vincent de Paul's Dining Room. In lieu of flowers, Socorro and family asked that a donation be sent to St. Vincent de Paul in Bill's memory."

Al Zon was honored at the February 15th Volunteer Appreciation luncheon with the revered St Vincent de Paul Len Hebert Humanitarian Award. Len presented Al with a plaque, but time did not allow him to elaborate on Al's accomplishments. Therefore I will take some space to enumerate some of Al's well known acts of compassion and some more of his life's history.

Al Zon was honored as February 2014 volunteer of the month by Jackson County Commissioners John Rachor, Don Skundrick, and Doug Breidenthal on January 29th in the Commissioners' Chamber. He was recognized for his seventeen years of service at St Vincent de Paul helping the needy of our county.

Al is Council Vice President of Operations as well as Past-President, Vice President and Current Treasurer of St Anthony's family shelter. He has been the "man in charge" for most of those years every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and "Go ask Al" is heard several times a day because of his expertise in dealing with all the challenges that come with providing all the daily services provided by all our wonderful volunteers.

Al Zon is the youngest of nine children born in 1933 and raised in the small French Catholic community of Oakwood, North Dakota near the borders of Minnesota and Manitoba, Canada. His amazing mother raised all nine children on her own when his father became ill.

Al worked for the railroad for many years, got married to Fran and started raising eight children.

He was in the Army for two years and received his degree in business education from Mayville College in North Dakota, almost simultaneously.

After teaching for three years in Elko, Neva-

da, he and his family moved to Phoenix, Oregon where he taught business at the Phoenix High School for twenty-seven years until he retired.

Besides volunteering at St Vincent de Paul, he volunteers as office manager at the AA Hotline where he has helped so many for years.

On top of all this, Al was very instrumental, along with Dave Moosman, in making the Urban Rest Stop a reality and a vital part of who we are, where anyone can shower and do laundry. Plaques recognizing their efforts, hang on the wall in the Urban Rest Stop as a reminder of what can be done when Christ inspires us to go the extra distance.

Al's continuing and faithful diligence in insuring that St Vincent is a safe place where thousands come to receive the help they need, is a shining example and a beacon of caring. Thank you for all you do always. I will continue to "ask Al".

Spring Fund Raising Generous

Spring fund raising has been very generous to St. Vincent's.

Most of the funds were ear-marked for Social Services. These included \$75,000 from the Oregon Community Foundation's Walker Fund. We also received \$15,000 from Medford's Carpenter Foundation.

The Cow Creek Umpqua Indian Foundation gave us \$10,000, as did OCF's Coleman Fund.

We received \$5,000 each from the Medford Water Commission and Pacific Power. Washington Elementary and the St. Martin de Porres Trust both gave us \$500.

The Pantry will receive \$10,000 from the Providence Foundation and \$1,000 from the Dwyer Charitable Trust.

We are also scheduled to receive Community Development Block Grants through the Cities of Ashland and Medford. Ashland will receive \$17,432 and Medford \$7,000.

The Urban Rest Stop has been a major focus of our fund raising efforts. The Meyer Memorial Trust awarded St. Vincent's nearly \$20,000 for the current remodeling. In addition, the Council has chosen to undertake a major \$125,000 expansion of the URS next summer.

To finance this, we are working closely with the Ben B. Chaney Foundation, Collins Foundation, Providence Foundation, Oregon Community Foundation and the new Jackson County Christian Charities Golf Invitational.
